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Introduction

In 2012, the Cleveland Plan for Transforming Schools laid out an innovative and expansive vision for addressing the challenges facing Cleveland's education system. The Cleveland Plan was created in response to a growing urgency that all children have access to high-quality education opportunities in every neighborhood. Part of that challenge was ensuring that high-quality preschool was available to all of Cleveland's children to support kindergarten readiness and future school success.

At the time the Cleveland Plan was initiated, only 16 percent of children were entering kindergarten in the Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD) fully prepared as measured by Ohio's Kindergarten Readiness Assessment, and only 24 percent of preschool-aged children in Cleveland were participating in high-quality preschool. In response to that challenge, PRE4CLE was developed in 2013 through an extensive community process as a collective impact initiative to support the rapid expansion of high-quality preschool opportunities in Cleveland.



PRE4CLE is led by The Cleveland Early Childhood Compact, a public-private leadership body that includes the Cleveland Metropolitan School District, Cuyahoga County, the City of Cleveland, Starting Point, Cleveland's high-quality preschool providers, and a broad set of community partners committed to working together to expand access to high-quality preschool and strengthen kindergarten readiness in Cleveland.

WHAT IS HIGH-QUALITY PRESCHOOL?

When we talk about high-quality preschool, we mean preschools that have earned a 3-, 4-, or 5-star rating in Ohio's Step Up To Quality rating system.

High-quality programs offer:

- **ENVIRONMENTS** that are fun, welcoming, safe and caring
- STAFF AND TEACHERS
 who are well-trained and professional
- RESEARCH-BASED CURRICULUM with lesson plans for each day's activities
- EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES to prepare your child for kindergarten
- CREATIVE AND IMAGINATIVE PLAY to inspire a lifelong love of learning
- FEEDBACK about your child's learning and progress

To accomplish that mission, PRE4CLE is guided by the PRE4CLE Plan, a set of community-level goals and strategies that drive high-quality preschool expansion and enrollment in the city of Cleveland. The PRE4CLE Plan is created through the leadership of the PRE4CLE staff and the Cleveland Early Childhood Compact and informed by feedback from community partners and PRE4CLE's network of preschool providers.

The pages that follow provide a refreshed set of goals and strategies for preschool expansion in Cleveland based on a new landscape of challenges and opportunities facing children, families, and the early learning system.

The PRE4CLE Plan is intended to be a living document that provides a roadmap for our community to work together to ensure that all young children in Cleveland can access high-quality preschool and start kindergarten prepared to succeed. We expect the goals and strategies laid out will support preschool expansion, and help to rebuild a stronger, more resilient, and more equitable early childhood education system in our community for generations to come.




Expansion of High-Quality Preschool in Cleveland: A Decade of Growth, a Time of Rebuilding

Since PRE4CLE's launch in 2014, the Early Childhood Compact partnered with preschool providers and a broad set of community partners to greatly expand access to high-quality preschool in Cleveland.


PRE4CLE supported this growth by:

- Convening early learning, K-12, government, philanthropic, and private sector partners to align strategies and resources with the goals of the PRE4CLE Plan:
- Using research and data to support the goals of the PRE4CLE Plan and track Cleveland's progress toward increased preschool access and kindergarten readiness;
- Focusing on equitable high-quality preschool access in every Cleveland neighborhood;
- Partnering with preschool providers to connect them to tools, resources, and key partners to increase quality and serve more children;
- Supporting families by removing barriers to preschool access and helping them find and enroll in high-quality preschool;
- Advocating for increased funding and improved policies for early learning at the local, state, and federal levels;
- Working with our lead partners to provide direct resources and services to children and preschool programs to support high-quality preschool expansion; and
- Collaborating with preschool providers in Cleveland to support preschool expansion through their work to increase quality, increase the number of children they serve, and support strategies to improve the preschool system.





ENROLLMENT IN HIGH-QUALITY PRESCHOOL IN CLEVELAND





Through this successful community partnership, enrollment in high-quality preschool increased by 72 percent in Cleveland between 2013 and 2019.


Between 2020 and 2022, however, enrollment dropped significantly due to the health and financial challenges posed by COVID-19. During the past three years, the ongoing COVID-19 crisis has pushed the already fragile early childhood education system to the limit. While many other sectors have rebounded, early childhood providers are still struggling, and the system has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels of operation.

Enrollment in high-quality preschool has been set back significantly and is 23 percent lower than it was before the shutdown in March of 2020.

Despite these challenges, the number of highquality preschool providers has continued to rise significantly. Between 2014 and 2022, the number of high-quality preschool providers in Cleveland increased from 71 to 227. This was accomplished through the work of our partners at Starting Point who work closely with preschool providers throughout Cleveland to help them improve their quality. Additionally, preschool providers, including those in CMSD, private preschools, Head Start centers, child care centers, and family child care homes have dedicated their time and resources to earn high-quality ratings. The number of high-quality preschool providers continued to climb between 2020 and 2022, showing the dedication of Cleveland's preschool programs to improve their quality despite the challenges of COVID-19.





STRUCTURAL CHALLENGES OF THE EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION SYSTEM:


BUILDING BACK STRONGER

COVID-19 exposed the fragility of the early childhood education system nationally and locally, resulting from decades of underinvestment and under-prioritization. The pandemic also exposed how critical early childhood education is to the cognitive and social development of our children as well as the stability of families and local economies. Several long-term structural challenges need to be addressed to support a full recovery and build a more resilient, stable, and equitable early childhood system, including:

- Increased public funding for compensation for early care and education teachers and staff that supports a living wage: Currently, child care teachers in Cuyahoga County earn an average of \$13 per hour (\$26,800 annually), even with a Bachelor's degree, and many have few to no benefits. At the same time, the cost of child care is unaffordable for many families. Adequate and consistent state and federal funding is critical to increasing compensation for the early childhood field while also increasing affordability for families.
- Expanded eligibility for child care: Currently, Ohio has one of the lowest eligibility levels in the nation, capping eligibility for child care subsidies at 142% of the federal poverty level, or approximately \$38,000 for a family of four. With the average private-pay cost of child care at \$11,000 per child in Cuyahoga County, expanding child care subsidies to more families is a crucial part of increasing access to high-quality early learning for Cleveland's children.
- Expanded state and federal funding to support the cost of operating a high-quality early learning program in Ohio's child care system through Ohio's Step Up To Quality system:

 Increased funding is needed to support the costs of maintaining a high-quality early learning program, including compensation for staff, professional development, curriculum and supplies, maintaining high-quality facilities, and other ongoing operational expenses. Most high-quality early learning providers are currently forced to operate on razor-thin margins, creating a system that is extremely vulnerable to instability.

PRE4CLE is working with public and private partners in Cleveland to address these structural challenges as reflected throughout the PRE4CLE Plan.




Even with the substantial increases in the number of high-quality preschool providers, enrollment is still struggling for several reasons. First, some parents are still hesitant to send children back to a group setting or have become accustomed to the informal child care arrangements they made out of necessity during the pandemic, such as having family members or friends watch their children. The greatest barrier, however, is that providers are struggling to hire and retain teachers, leaving whole classrooms of seats empty without adequate staffing. It is difficult to pin down exactly how much the teacher shortage has impacted overall preschool capacity, but the ongoing enrollment challenges indicate it is substantial.



THE GAP BETWEEN ENROLLMENT AND CAPACITY

While the number of high-quality providers has continued to increase and overall capacity numbers are regaining ground, enrollment remains significantly lower than pre-pandemic levels. This gap is being driven by staffing shortages caused by the chronically low wages of the early care and education field. As wages increased in most other sectors during the pandemic, wages for early care and education teachers, administrators, and staff remain well below the average hourly wage for most other professions. This staffing shortage is forcing many providers to keep classrooms closed temporarily, leaving a significant portion of the current preschool capacity in Cleveland unable to be utilized. Increasing public resources for the compensation of preschool teachers and staff is critical to addressing this shortage and reopening preschool classrooms.

The incredible efforts to increase the number of high-quality preschool providers across the city supported a significant increase in kindergarten readiness between 2013 and 2019. During that period, the number of children entering CMSD fully prepared for kindergarten increased by eight percentage points, and children who participated in high-quality preschool were significantly more prepared for kindergarten than their peers in lower-quality preschool settings. In the fall of 2021, however, kindergarten readiness dropped significantly due to the disruption of COVID-19 for children, families, and preschool providers.



The COVID-19 crisis laid bare the existing weaknesses in the child care and early education system. Long-term, sustainable investments are needed to build a newly resilient system that offers high-quality care and education to children, reliable and affordable care to working families, and fair compensation for child care and early education professionals.

The 2023 PRE4CLE Plan seeks to build on the strengths of Cleveland's preschool system while also urgently addressing the need for greater investment, alignment, and advocacy to ensure that we can rapidly rebuild a stronger and more equitable early learning system that supports children, families, and our economy.

PRE4CLE Lead Partners

PRE4CLE is a collective impact initiative implemented by several lead partners. These lead partners are all working toward the common goal of ensuring all children in Cleveland have access to high-quality preschool and enter kindergarten ready to succeed.

CUYAHOGA COUNTY OFFICE OF EARLY CHILDHOOD | INVEST IN CHILDREN | The

Cuyahoga County Office of Early Childhood–Invest in Children (IIC) is the administrator of Cuyahoga County's Universal Pre-kindergarten program (UPK). UPK offers preschool providers in the city of Cleveland the opportunity to improve their quality and award scholarships to families. Expanding UPK is PRE4CLE's primary local strategy to fund high-quality preschools and expand access to more families. In addition to UPK, IIC also invests additional funds to support quality improvement for child care providers and mental health services for preschool classrooms.

starting Point | Starting Point provides support to the PRE4CLE Plan through their quality improvement staff, who support community-based providers in earning and maintaining their Step Up To Quality ratings. The ongoing technical support Starting Point provides ensures the network of high-quality preschools in Cleveland continues to grow and thrive. Additionally, Starting Point's data analytics team provides PRE4CLE with capacity and enrollment data to help guide our evaluation and decisions about our work. Starting Point also serves as Cleveland's resource and referral agency by assisting families who are looking for preschools and maintaining a database of preschools.

PRE4CLE PROVIDERS

PRE4CLE Providers—CMSD schools, community-based child care centers, Head Start programs, and family child care homes—are the backbone of PRE-4CLE, working with Cleveland's preschool children and their families every day to bring the goals of PRE4CLE to life.



THE CITY OF CLEVELAND

CMSD is a mayoralcontrolled school district, so the city and school district are closely linked. The city's ongoing support of PRE4CLE as a strategy to support the mayor's overall vision for education in Cleveland provides leverage for local, state, and federal advocacy.

CLEVELAND METROPOLITAN SCHOOL DISTRICT The PRE4CLE Plan was created to fulfill a core goal of Cleveland's Plan for Transforming Schools, which was led by the Cleveland Metropolitan School District (CMSD). CMSD invests levy dollars into their preschool programs and ensures their preschool classrooms meet high-quality standards. Preschool education is an integral part of CMSD's overall strategy to support Cleveland's children.

How to Read the 2023 PRE4CLE Plan

The first PRE4CLE plan was written in 2013 and guided PRE4CLE's key partners through the first set of goals set forth by The Cleveland Early Childhood Compact. The initial plan and subsequent 2016 update provided guidance through the first nine years of operation—moving into our tenth year we are excited to build upon the foundation with our 2023 PRE4CLE Plan.

This updated plan continues to present a series of goals for Cleveland's preschool system and strategies to meet those goals but is now formatted to show the community the full scale of the work our key partners are doing to support the PRE4CLE Plan and written in response to the current Cleveland preschool land-scape. Some strategies in the 2023 Plan are currently being implemented by PRE4CLE staff and/or lead partners, while others are strategies we hope to implement in the next three years.

The goal of this new plan is threefold:



Capture the resources our community needs to realize our goals



Provide clarity to the community that PRE4CLE is not a singular organization, but rather a collective impact initiative powered by key partners



Bring us closer to our ultimate goal: that every child in Cleveland has access to highquality preschool and enters kindergarten ready to succeed



PRE4CLE's enrollment goals are focused on recruiting families to high-quality preschool programs. Currently, the greatest barrier to enrollment is the challenges providers are still struggling to overcome in the wake of the COVID-19 crisis. These challenges and the way they intersect with equity are outlined in the previous Plan Element.

As PRE4CLE continues to respond to those challenges, we are also closely considering how we can better tackle other equity issues. Our recruitment team continues to seek out partnerships and tactics that will help us reach all Cleveland families, with particular attention paid to communities that continue to be under-served due to language and cultural barriers.

Additionally, PRE4CLE is seeking ways to ensure that the Early Learning system and our key partners have the resources necessary to continue and grow their work. This includes supporting Starting Point in securing additional funding for their outreach and referral services that are critical to PRE4CLE's work and the success of our city, county, and region.

PRE4CLE will work to ensure preschool experiences for Cleveland families and children are consistently high-quality, regardless of where a provider is located.

Ensuring that all early learning programs have the resources they need to improve their quality is essential to creating equitable access to enriching and supportive early learning environments for all children. In this PRE4CLE Plan update, we also included an expanded focus on equity for early childhood professionals through prioritizing advocacy for increased compensation and benefits for Cleveland early learning workforce and expanding professional development options. Also new in this Plan update is an increased focus on the facility quality of our PRE4CLE Providers through Cleveland Early Learning Spaces, which will work to eliminate health and environmental disparities within our early learning settings. Finally, we will look to create an expanded definition of high-quality preschool in Cleveland that focuses on the additional elements of quality needed to support equity for children, providers, and families within our preschool system.

PRE4CLE is seeking ways to ensure that the Early Learning system and our key partners have the resources necessary to continue and grow their work. Early care and education has historically been underfunded compared to other parts of the education system. To fully realize the goals of PRE4CLE, the system must be funded equitably. Throughout this Plan, we have outlined the resources that are needed to build a sustainable and resilient child care and early education system that offers high-quality care and education to children, reliable and affordable options to families, and fair compensation for child care and early education professionals.

PRE4CLE Leadership and Structure

The Cleveland Early Childhood Compact is the leadership body for PRE4CLE and convenes our lead partners as well as other key public and private community partners to oversee and support the implementation of The PRE4CLE Plan, including the lead agency and PRE4CLE staff.



The Educational Service Center of Northeast Ohio currently serves

as the lead agency for PRE4CLE and provides administrative, fiscal, and legal oversight of the PRE4CLE staff.

The PRE4CLE staff is charged with leading the implementation of the PRE4CLE Plan, including strategy development, fundraising, advocacy, partner engagement, and executing core strategies of the PRE4CLE Plan.

PRE4CLE Providers collaborate with PRE4CLE and each other to implement the goals of the PRE4CLE

Plan, serve as an advisory board, and receive financial, marketing, and other support to enhance their programs. PRE4CLE Providers have received a 3-, 4-, or 5-star rating in Ohio's Step Up To Quality rating system and are meeting additional requirements related to teacher qualifications and student-to-teacher ratios.



Evaluation

To gauge the success of Cleveland's preschool goals, we must plan for and conduct ongoing evaluation of our progress. PRE4CLE evaluation will include pre-determined measures and may continue to evolve over time as additional and more accurate measures become available.

PRE4CLE's evaluation is focused on the impact of increased access to high-quality preschool at two levels: on individual children's kindergarten readiness and the city's entire preschool system.

PRE4CLE's Evaluation will include:

- 1. **An Annual Report** that provides an update on progress toward community-level goals for the preschool system over a calendar year using both qualitative and quantitative measures.
- 2. An annual Cleveland Kindergarten Readiness Snapshot, an online tool that will include a number of indicators that show progress over time along with important context about the preschool system. The snapshot will be updated once per year. At minimum, indicators will include:
 - Kindergarten readiness assessment data provided by CMSD in partnership with the Center on Urban
 Poverty and Community Development at Case Western
 Reserve University (The Poverty Center) and Starting
 Point.
- High-Quality Preschool capacity and enrollment data provided by Starting Point in partnership with the Poverty Center.
- 3. Additional evaluation strategies as necessary will be developed to support other areas of PRE4CLE's work, including Early Learning Spaces, workforce and compensation, and impact of outreach activities.
